girl's father, 43-year-old Leonard Elliott, of Valence Avenue, Dagenham, Essex, stormed out of court. "This is a farce of British justice," he shouted. Mr. Elliott was restrained by police when he came back into court and remonstrated with the magis-

trate, Mr. Donald Forbes. Mr. Forbes told Pauline Elliott accused of house-breaking and stealing 18s. from a meter—that her bail plea was to be considered by a judge.

After the hearing, Mr. Elliott said: "My marriage was dissolved, and I must have Pauline at home to look after my three other children."

Another girl who appeared with Pauline Elliott, 17-year-old Catherine Williams, was allowed bail. Both girls were alleged to have broken into the home of Catherine's father at Morris Road, Dagenham.

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## New fivers to beat the forgers

A NEW £5 note is to be introduced by the Royal Bank of Scotland because of forgeries. The Bank stressed yesterday that existing notes were not being called in, as suggested in a report at the weekend.

The notes to be withdrawn as and when they return to the Bank, are genuine notes bearing the serial numbers which have appeared on the forgeries—H325, H825 and H8211.

The Bank said that apart from an attempt to pass 6,000 forged notes in Switzerland, the total of forged £5 notes which had come to its notice amounted to not more than a few hundred. The forged notes first appeared in Edinburgh and Glasgow last month.

## Guarantee plan for new homes

LOCAL councils should guarantee that new homes are properly built, a union chief said last night.

The suggestion was made by Mr. George Lowthian, general secretary of the Building Trade Workers' Union, who said that council inspectors, already responsible for structural soundness of new houses, could also supervise the quality of finish.

Mr. Lowthian, speaking at Bexley, Kent, said too many building firms were still in the "wheelbarrow and spade age."

## 'Champagne Tony' killed as plane hits golf course

**A** MERICAN golfer "Champagne Tony" Lema died last night in a light plane which crashed in flames on the seventh green of a golf course. With him died his wife Betty and their pilot and co-pilot. The plane plunged into the course at Lansing, Illinois, where Lema was due to play in a 12,000-dollar tournament. Lema, 32, was one of golf's big money-spinners. In 1961 he took the British Open title at his first attempt. He won his nickname because of his habit of ordering champagne all round for the Press room when he won tournaments.

## FOREST DEATH: MAN REMANDED

**A** MAN accused of murdering 15-year-old schoolgirl Marion Hartley was said yesterday to have told the police: "I was very drunk and didn't know what I was doing."

The man, 20-year-old Joseph Kiely, of no fixed address, is alleged to have killed Marion early on Sunday near her home in Forest Glade, Chingford, Essex—at the edge of Epping Forest.

Yesterday, Detective Superintendent Jim Graney told the magistrates at Stratford, East London, that he spoke to Kiely on Sunday evening at a police station.

Superintendent Graney said that he told Kiely: "As a result of a post mortem examination of Marion Hartley, whom you took into the forest last night, I have ascertained that she died of manual strangulation and suffocation."

Kiely who comes from Dublin was remanded in custody for eight days. He was allowed to see his two sisters before leaving the court building.
